# Feast of Saint Martin of Tours - November 11

Saint Martin of Tours was born a pagan in what is now Hungary around 316, but he was raised in Italy where his father, a tribune, was posted. At 15 he was compelled to serve in the Roman military, though he was already a catechumen. There is a popular legend that while on campaign the saint cut his cloak in half to share with a cold beggar. That night he had a dream of Jesus - who was wearing his half-cloak - and when he awoke, his cloak was restored. He was baptized at 18. Only two years after his baptism, he was released from the military, he had refused his battle pay and to fight saying he was a soldier for Christ. He is the first recognized conscientious objector.

After his release from the military, he became a disciple of Hilary of Poitiers. He worked diligently against the Arian heresy, which denies the divinity of Jesus Christ, and established a community of hermits near Poitiers in 361, the first French monastery. His reputation for

holiness and kindness was universally recognized.

In 371 he reluctantly became bishop of Tour. There is a famous story of Martin, wishing to remain secluded, going to hide himself as the people were coming to acclaim him as Bishop. He was nearly successful but, as the people were ready to leave, out came a honking goose who got everyone's attention and proceeded to lead the crowd right to the hay stack where Martin was hiding! Unable to resist their demands, Martin agreed to be Bishop - but vowed his revenge against the goose: His festive installation dinner featured roast goose as the main course!

Saint Martin died in Candes-Saint-Martin, Gaul in 397. He is notably one of the first saints who was not a martyr. His feast day became one of the most popularly observed in medieval Europe becoming something like our observance of Thanksgiving. Many customs and traditions are associated with it, as well. To this day, menus across Europe at this time of year feature a specially added and very popular dish to their menus: Roast Goose.
