

In May 2023, for the first time in almost three quarters of a century, a monarch was crowned in England. Some people took the opportunity to scoff, "What a waste of time and energy! What is the point of a king?"

But, an event seemingly removed from

our own day-to-day reality like the coronation of King Charles, can remind all of us of something needed in every person and community: confidence in the future. The king's most basic role is to symbolize the unity of the nation. In England, the parliament members handle many of the practical duties of governance. But the king or queen can do what they cannot: embody in a single person the reality and future of a whole nation. To say, "this is our king" is to say, "we exist as a community, and we have a future." Kingship isn't primarily about the power of one person or family.
